

Revelation 19—part 3 Verses 11-16 From Sermon 1.20.19

Read Revelation 19:11-16

Questions, Answers, and Review from Sunday's sermon: <u>after 18 chapters of judgment, wrath, destruction</u>, we arrive at Christ's return. What John sees is a very different side of Jesus than the <u>one in Gospels and even somewhat from the side presented previously in this book.</u> All things are <u>now fulfilled. He keeps His promise to return, physically, to earth and restore all things.</u>

Homework: Read through Isaiah 63 and Matthew 24

What similarities do you see in this chapter to Revelation 19? What new or additional information do you see? [scan through chapter, if you haven't read it by study time]

Isaiah 63— Jesus comes in wrath. Garments stained. He is righteous.

Israel is restored nationally and spiritually.

They repent.

Matthew 24—The Tribulation ends with His Coming.

No one will miss it.

Going Further

What did Jesus' Words cause in the past?

- Genesis 1:3 & 26 and Colossians 1:16— all things to be created
- Acts 7:38-39—the Law of God to be given
- John 1:17—The Law and, later, grace and truth through Christ
- *John 6:68*—Eternal Life

What do Jesus' Words produce at His 2nd Coming? <u>Death</u> See also *Revelation 19:21 & Isaiah 11:4*

How was Jesus treated and received at His First Coming? <u>Various answers</u>. <u>Rejected</u>. <u>Falsely accused</u>. <u>With contempt</u>. <u>Submitted to earthly authorities</u>, <u>kings/governors</u>. <u>At the end: He was beaten</u>, <u>tortured</u>, <u>spit on</u>, <u>mocked</u>, <u>stripped</u>, <u>killed</u>. <u>His followers persecuted</u>.

How will He be received at His Second Coming? <u>Various answers</u>. <u>Just the opposite! All will submit to Him. Every knee will bow. The world will suffer and die. His followers glorified.</u>

On Sunday, it was pointed out that, although many names and titles for Christ are given in Revelation 19, which one is noticeably absent? <u>Jesus</u>

Why do you suppose that is? <u>Various answers: but, Jesus means "God saves"</u>. The saving is done. <u>His second coming is not to save the world, but to judge it.</u>

Of all the names and titles given in Revelation 19 (review from bulletin), which one do you cherish most? Why?

What is the "...name written that no one knew except Himself." (verse 12)? [trick question. No one knows]
